- This week's academic vocabulary word is RESOURCES. Here are 2 ways to give your child extra opportunities to hear and use the word RESOURCES!
  - ♦ If there were a big storm coming and we might lose our electricity, we would have to get all the RESOURCES we need and put them someplace we could easily find them in the dark. What kind of RESOURCES do we have that would help us if all the lights went out? (E.g., flashlights, candles)
  - ◆ If you were with a friend and hungry and neither of you had much money, you might say, "Let's pool our RESOURCES and go get a bagel to split!" To "pool RESOURCES" means to put all the money together (like in a big pool!) so you have enough to buy what you both want. If you "pooled your RESOURCES," with a friend and you both had \$1.00, what would you buy to split?
    - Remind your child that the word RESOURCES means a place, person or thing that supplies something useful to you, or a supply of something that can be used when needed.
- How else can you build your child's reading skills through TALK?
  - Try these questions taken from different TalkOn age groups this week!
    - Children around the world love playgrounds. What are the two words inside the compound word playground? (play, ground) Let's change each word to its opposite and make some crazy new compound words! (E.g., worksky!)
    - ◆ Some areas of the world have **very little** rain, and some places have **a lot** of rain. Do you think children who live in really rainy areas play out in the rain **more** than children who aren't used to rainy weather? Why?
    - ◆ A school in Brussels, the capital of Belgium, serves lunch by putting **large pans** of food in the middle of the lunch table and having children serve themselves. What kind of **rules** would they need to make sure that lunch went smoothly?
