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- This week's academic vocabulary word is DISTINCT. Here are 2 ways to give your child extra opportunities to hear and use the word DISTINCT!
 - ◆ Before there were fire alarms, people who got out of burning buildings in the middle of the night often said that the **DISTINCT** smell of something burning woke them up and got them going. Have you ever had a **DISTINCT** smell wake you up at night or in the morning?
 - ◆ Are there any DISTINCT signs that the seasons are changing where you live? What are the DISTINCT signs that the seasons are changing?
 - Remind your child that the word **DISTINCT** means something is very different from other things because of how it looks, smells, feels or sounds.
- How else can you build your child's reading skills through TALK?
 - o Try these questions taken from different TalkOn age groups this week:
 - ◆ **Pre-cip-i-ta-tion** is a long word that means the water that comes down from the sky as rain, snow, sleet or hail. Let's say the word and clap out all the syllables in **pre-cip-i-ta-tion**. How many syllables are there? (5)
 - ◆ The wind doesn't make a sound on its own; it has to blow against something outside or pass through something to make a noise. Does that surprise you? What if you could only make a noise by blowing against something?
 - ◆ Sometimes we hear about **bad storms** far, far away that ruin homes and even whole towns. Do you feel any differently when a bad storm affects a **nearby** town, rather than a place **far away**? Why?
