Abound Parenting News -- UPDATE Theme: *Celebrations* (week 1)



This week's WordUp word is SIGNIFICANT. Here are 2 *more* ways to give your child opportunities to hear and use this abstract word.

- If someone wanted to paint the apartment door orange, that wouldn't be a very big deal, but if someone wanted to paint the whole outside of the apartment building orange, that would be a SIGNIFICANT change. How could we make a SIGNIFICANT change to this room with one bucket of paint?
- Something that's INSIGNIFICANT is something that is not SIGNIFICANT, it isn't important enough to worry about or notice. The IN at the beginning is a prefix that means NOT. If you got an INSIGNIFICANT amount of homework, it might only take a little bit of time. Do you prefer to have a SIGNIFICANT amount of homework to do, or an INSIGNIFICANT amount?
 - Remind your child that SIGNIFICANT means something important that people give attention to, or a large amount of something that people would notice.

How else can you build your child's reading skills through TALK?

Try these questions taken from different TalkOn age groups this week:

- Wilma's wedding was wonderful! All those words begin with the same /w/ sound and the letter W. Let's say that sentence together and listen for that /w/ sound. Can we think of other words that begin with the /w/ sound and the letter W? (e.g., wizard, wing, winter)
- Do you like to get presents wrapped or unwrapped? The **un** at the beginning of **un**wrapped means not, so an **un**wrapped gift is not wrapped. Why do you think people wrap gifts anyway?
- In many cultures, a baby's first birthday is a big event. Do you think a first birthday celebration is more fun for the parents or the baby? Why do you think so?
- Is it okay to change your mind about going to a party when you already told the hosts that you
 would go? How do you think people feel when you don't come?
